

Nature lovers bring a halt to tree chopping exercise in Vasant Kunj

Verhaen Khanna of the New Delhi Nature Society said, “The Forest Department had only sanctioned ‘light pruning’ of the 95 trees which is different from ‘heavy pruning’ and ‘headbacking’, as per guidelines. In light pruning, branches of approximately 20 cm girth can be cut. But the South MCD Horticulture department, on being prodded by some residents, chopped off branches of 80 cm girth.”

“We condemn this behavior by some narrow-minded people as we can’t destroy our environment for their sake. In winter, they want sunlight and trees chopped. In summer, the same sunlight will be too harsh for them and they will sit indoors and switch on their air conditioners complaining of Delhi’s heat and pollution,” Khanna said.

‘Trees protect us, we should save them’

Some residents in Lajpat Nagar’s I-Block were getting 12-15 trees pruned by the MCD staff recently. Other residents saw this and got agitated.

Initially they were clueless – as in who to inform or complain to. Then they contacted me through my Facebook page. They sent me photos and the address of the place where this incident took place.

When I reached the spot, I asked the men who were cutting the trees to show the documents or permission letter. But they were not able to produce any. They disappeared after I told them that I am calling the police. The police came, but were not helpful at all. They said if it were done by the MCD, then no permission is required. But from my experience, I know that even if MCD, DDA, PWD they ordered it, permission is required.

8 acres of mangroves to be cut for Navi Mumbai airport road

Deadline On Mind, Stilt Road To Run Along The Ground

WHAT CHANGED

An aerial road was planned along the Navi Mumbai airport's northern boundary or stilts to prevent wetland destruction. It was to come up on stilts, rising 1,200 metres long, covering eight acres of mangroves. Extra high tension electric lines were to be carried alongside, but building of the stilt bridges was proving to be a delaying factor. Now, Cidco says the road will be covered along the ground by cutting the mangroves with the power lines passing through ducts along it.

The City Industrial Development Corporation (CIDCO), Navi Mumbai's planning authority, said an aerial road on stilts was planned along the airport's northern boundary according to the conditions laid down by the Maharashtra Council - Zone Management Authority (MZYMA). Roads in mangrove areas are built on stilts to prevent wetland destruction. The bridges were to be of a total length of 1,200 metres, covering eight acres of mangroves. Now, Cidco says the road will be at grade (on the ground).

so that extra high voltage transmission lines, which need to be shifted to the periphery of the airport, can pass through ducts along the road.

While environmental clearance was granted in 2017, Cidco said constraints were brought to develop the 40-metre wide road along the north boundary on stilts. "Since the EHV lines have to pass along the same corridor, the building of bridges is leading to delays, thus affecting the timelines for the entire KMDA project," Cidco said. It said it will be faster to just lay a road on the ground and make the EHV lines pass through a duct.

The MZMA's EAC had decided that the request to cut eight acres of mangroves can be granted subject to strict compliance of the mangrove replantation plan.

'CAUSE OF FIRE DOUBTFUL'

The fire brigade's report on the December 3 fire at Aarey says suspicious activities and trespassing cannot be ruled out. Here are other important highlights:

- Nobody came forward as an eye witness
- Unburnt and unaffected portions despite such huge fire raises questions
- Police to conduct further investigation

The report says dousing the fire was a difficult task since the terrain was hilly and difficult to access. The plot was barricaded with barbed wire and the presence of wild animals, as well as the absence of electricity, proved to be a challenge. Strong winds and absence of an aerial mode of firefighting was a problem.

While the report specifically mentions fire will now be investigated by the police, a senior police officer investigating the matter said, "We have not yet got any report from the fire brigade and we have referred all concerned agencies including forest department to submit their reports to us. Although our investigation is on from day one I will not be able to comment anything on this until the final report is ready."

State forest minister Subhir Mungantiwar said the land where the fire broke out is private property. "If the fire department report has raised any doubt, then the state home department will look into it," he said.

HC prohibits tree felling in Dodamarg again



WHY ARE THE FORESTS IMPORTANT?

- The Dodamarg-Sawantwadi belt lies in the heart of the biodiversity hotspot, the Western Ghats

- It is an integral part of the Sahyadri-Konkan Wildlife corridor through which several wild animals such as the Asiatic elephant and the critically-endangered tiger move

WHY DOES IT MATTER?

The Union environment ministry, in a draft notification on Oct 3, proposed the declaration of 3% of the Western Ghats as ESA, but left out the 18km-long forest of Dodamarg-Sawantwadi belt. This is the second time this corridor has been left out after a similar draft notification in 2015. ESA status would protect it from mining, quarrying, construction of buildings and townships, etc.

Vanashakti. "We direct the respondents (various agencies under the state and Centre) not to allow tree cutting/felling in Dodamarg taluka, Sindhudurg district."

HT was the first to report on October 22 that the elephant and tiger corridor along the Maharashtra-Gujarat border in the Western Ghats had not been marked an ESA by the Union environment ministry (see box). The court took cognisance of the latest draft notification that left out Dodamarg. "The government pleader has pointed out that, in fact, in the draft notification dated October 3, 2018, villages from Sawantwadi taluka were mentioned, but villages from Dodamarg have been excluded," the order said. "We are not convinced with the reasons as to why such exclusion was made."

The HC bench further directed that the counsel appearing for the Centre shall take instructions and make a statement in this regard on the next date of hearing, January 14. "We direct the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change (MoEFCC) to take an independent decision in respect of the request made by the petitioners (to declare the area an ESA)," the order said.

The counsel representing MoEFCC said they will be declaring the area an ESA based on inputs from the Maharashtra government. "Our stand is the state has to earmark the villages in Dodamarg to be declared as ESA. We cannot do it on our own. We are awaiting the state's response," said Parag Vyasa, advocate appearing for the Centre. The state government said the process to identify villages will soon be underway.



वसंतकुंज में मंजूरी व नियमों के विरुद्ध पेड़ों की कटाई

नई दिल्ली। राष्ट्रीय राजधानी में बड़े और छायादार पेड़ों की हल्की काट-छाट के नाम पर उन्हें बड़ी क्षति पहुँचाई जा रही है। ताजा मामला वसंतकुंज के सेक्टर-ए में पॉकेट-सी का है। यहाँ वन विभाग के जरिए 95 पेड़ों की सशर्त छंटाई की मंजूरी दी गई थी। लेकिन, बागवानी विभाग के जरिए शर्तों का उल्लंघन कर पेड़ों की बड़ी और मोटी डालें काटी जा रही हैं।

न्यू दिल्ली नेचर सोसाइटी के संयोजक और पर्यावरणविद वीरहन खन्ना का कहना है कि मौजूदा वायु प्रदूषण की समस्या के बीच पेड़ों को बचाने के बजाए वन विभाग इन्हें क्षति पहुँचा रहा है। हर तरह की छंटाई पर पूरी तरह रोक लगनी चाहिए। गौरतलब है कि दक्षिणी नगर निगम क्षेत्र के बागवानी विभाग की मांग पर 19 दिसंबर को पश्चिमी उप वन संरक्षक ने पेड़ों के काट-छाट की मंजूरी दी थी। हालाँकि, वन विभाग की ओर से कई शर्तें भी जोड़ी गई थीं।

Forest dept puts tree pruning permit on hold in Vasant Kunj

NEW DELHI: The forest department has put on hold the nod given to prune trees at Vasant Kunj in south Delhi after it was found that large branches were being chopped off in the name of 'light pruning'.

"I have directed the forest department to keep in abeyance all permissions of tree pruning that were issued in Vasant Kunj. We had given permission to prune trees in Vasant Kunj. But large branches were being chopped off. I have also asked the department initiate proceedings as per law," said Imran Hussain, forest minister of Delhi.

The forest department had issued permission to the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC) on December 19, to prune around 95 trees. The permission was given for 'light pruning' which allowed cutting of branches up to 30cm in girth.

The permission also said that not more than four branches would be pruned from one tree. At least four such permissions

were given in December in Vasant Kunj area.

"We received several complaints from local residents and environment activists that large branches with more than 30cm girth were being chopped down. An inspection was carried out. Thereafter the pruning was stopped and permissions were

put on hold," said a senior official of the forest department, who did not wish to be named.

The south civic body had approached the forest department on December 16 for pruning of the trees.

"We will have to check what kind of permission for pruning was granted. I have asked the

deputy director horticulture to look into the matter," said Alok Singh, director of horticulture at SDMC.

Earlier in July this year, the forest department had to revoke the permission given to the public sector construction firm NBCC for felling trees for its colony redevelopment projects in south Delhi. There was a widespread outrage and a series of litigations were filed against felling of trees in seven south Delhi neighbourhoods for the re-development projects.

"I received information on December 26 that trees were being heavily chopped. I informed other environment activists. We saw that large branches, measuring more than 30cm, were being cut and loaded on tempos. I called the forest department and it stopped temporarily. But the chopping started again on December 27. That was when we called the deputy conservator of forest (west) and lodged a complaint. I am very happy that the permission has been put on hold," said Bindu Kapurea, a resident of Vasant Kunj.

S corp'n told to stop pruning in VK after greens report hacking

New Delhi: After green activists pointed to the hacking of trees under the guise of pruning at Vasant Kunj, the Delhi forest department has asked the horticulture department of South Delhi Municipal Corporation to "immediately cease the activity" in the area.

In a letter addressed to directors (horticulture) of south and Najafgarh zones, the deputy conservator of forest (west forest division) said the pruning permissions issued by the department are to be kept in abeyance till further orders.

Delhi environment minister Imran Hussain on Saturday tweeted that action would be taken against the violators. "After complaints regarding the violation of conditions of permission, detailed inspections were carried out twice by the forest department staff. All recent permissions for concerned horticulture wing have been kept in abeyance and offence proceedings have already been initiated," Hussain tweeted.


Bindu Kapurea, a Vasant Kunj resident who raised the matter to the forest department, said 10-15 trees have been hacked during the exercise at Sector A Pocket C of Vasant Kunj.

"The forest department had permitted light pruning of 95 trees. The exercise was done on around 32 of them, while 10-15 have been gutted. It's being called

pruning, but they have been cutting heavy logs," Kapurea said.

A forest department official said that after receiving complaints from the activists about the trees being hacked in the name of pruning, a team was sent for inspection. "Our staff went on Thursday and saw that the permission was being misused. They instructed the men to stop, but after they left, it continued. We got another message from a local activist and we went back to find more trees damaged beyond permission. It's an offence under the Delhi Preservation of Tree Act and action will be taken against all violators," the official told TOI.

Delhi is one of the greenest cities in the country. According to Economic Survey of Delhi 2017-18, the total forest and tree cover has increased to 305.41 sq km in 2017 from 299.77 sq km in 2015. The city's green cover has also increased from around 20.2% in 2015 to 20.5% in 2017. The Economic Survey of Delhi 2014-2015 stated that the city had a tree cover of 287.81 sq km in 2013 or 20.06% of the total area of the capital.




Do Not Buy Paint Brushes Made From Mongoose Hair



In a joint raid in thirteen (13) different locations at the same time, led by Wildlife Crime Control Bureau, Government of India and State Forest Departments, over 3500 number of #Mongoosehairbrushes were seized on 10-12-2018 from Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh. Wildlife Trust of India through its extensive volunteer-based network assisted the operation at various stages.

All six species of mongoose are protected under schedule II part II of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 and added protection by CITES under Appendix II with a zero quota on commercial trade. About 40 grams of hair is plucked (pulled out with fingers) from the just killed, warm bodies of mongooses to be used in making paint brushes. Usually, no more than about 50% or 20 grams turns out to be of paintbrush quality as per the manufacturers. Thus, 50 mongooses lose their lives for a kilogram of usable hair.

De-Choke Trees

The Hon'ble National Green Tribunal in its order dated 23rd April 2013 has directed all Public Authorities to ensure that all the sign boards, names, advertisements, any kind of boards or signage's, electric wires and high tension cables or otherwise are removed from the trees.

They shall also ensure that the concrete surrounding the trees within one meter of the trees are removed and all the trees are looked after well and due precaution is taken in future so that no concrete or construction or repairing work is done at least within one meter radius of the trunk of trees.
