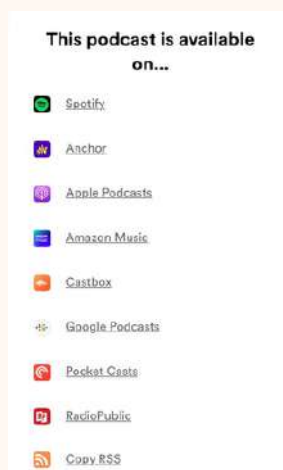

Space Matters




New Delhi Nature Society held up an educational session with Space Matters, an organization of architects working on creating space that contributes positively to the environment.

No More Reckless Tree Felling



Tree felling nod: HC flags 'non-application of mind'

New Delhi: Delhi High Court has observed that permissions granted by Delhi government for felling of trees seem to suggest that there is "total non-application of mind".

In an order dated August 31, the single-judge bench of Justice Jasmeet Singh said, "Some of the permissions showed that trees were permitted to be cut for individuals requiring parking spaces for their vehicles".

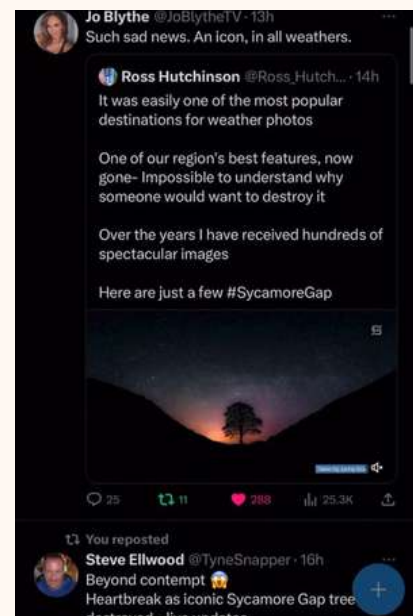
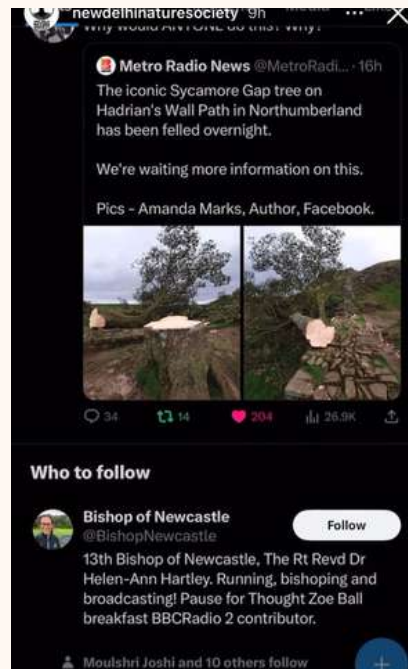
A petition had been filed seeking contempt action against officials for not following court directions passed in April last year requiring tree officers to spell out reasons for permitting trees to be cut in Delhi.

The petitioner had sought

early hearing of the matter, submitting that despite last year's order, the authorities were "recklessly" granting permission to cut trees. The court directed the authorities to bring the files pertaining to granting of permissions in cases where trees have been felled. The next hearing in the matter has been scheduled for September 14.

A forest department official submitted before the court that till the next date of hearing, no permission for felling of trees for any individual will be granted, and any permission required for important projects will be intimated to the court. The submission was made by Delhi government's counsel Dhairya Gupta. *tnw*

The spotlight has shifted to Deer Park in Hauz Khas, where an intriguing question has arisen: Who's removing the deer from Deer Park? Recent reports have brought to light a significant change that's raising eyebrows - the proposed relocation of over 600 deer by the Central Zoo Authority (CZA). 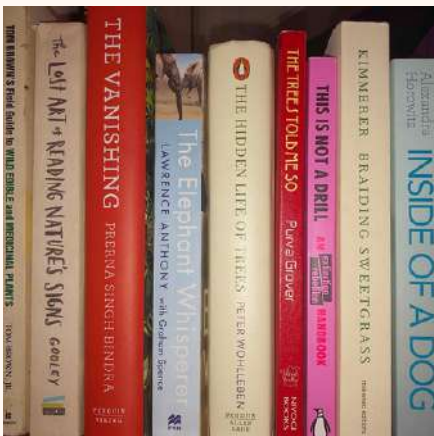

De-Choke Trees

The Hon'ble National Green Tribunal in its order dated 23rd April 2013 has directed all Public Authorities to ensure that all the sign boards, names, advertisements, any kind of boards or signage's, electric wires and high tension cables or otherwise are removed from the trees.

They shall also ensure that the concrete surrounding the trees within one meter of the trees are removed and all the trees are looked after well and due precaution is taken in future so that no concrete or construction or repairing work is done at least within one meter radius of the trunk of trees.

- Ask them to show the Forest Department permission.
- No permission, then Call 100 and wait till help arrives.
- Report the matter on the Green Helpline 1800118600
- Write a letter to the Forest Department
- If they do have permission, then take the supervisor's details who must be present there and contact the Forest Department .
