Podcast With Bhoomi Ecoclub Of Kirori Mal College



NDNS founder Verhaen Khanna joined members of the Bhoomi Ecoclub from Kirori Mal College on a recent episode of their podcast to discuss a pressing question: Is Gen Z really saving the planet?

The conversation examined the gap between the generation's vocal climate consciousness on social media and its tangible impact on ground-level conservation. Panelists discussed the rise of youth-led initiatives — from birdwatching walks to campus sustainability drives — while questioning whether such efforts are substantive or largely symbolic.

The discussion also touched on consumerism, biodiversity loss, and the shift toward community-driven environmental action. While no definitive conclusion was reached, the exchange offered a grounded look at the evolving relationship between Gen Z and genuine ecological responsibility.

Podhcast Episode 78

The founders also trace how a trekking experience became the spark behind many of the program's activities. At its heart, the episode is a conversation about mental health, mindfulness, and community — and the quiet, powerful ways nature can help us slow down and heal.

Meanwhile, the grasslands and undergrowth buzzed with babblers, bulbuls, common hawk-cuckoos, ashy prinias, yellow wagtails, and well-camouflaged paddyfield pipits, showcasing why Okhla remains a cherished urban haven.

Nature Walk At Buddha Jayanti Park

Nature Walk At Sanjay Van



NDNS recently led a nature walk through Sanjay Van, one of Delhi's last remaining urban forests and a haven of biodiversity tucked away from the city's relentless pace.

Bushcraft Workshop

Beyond the practical skills, the experience fostered patience, resourcefulness, and a renewed respect for nature's ability to provide — proving that survival in the wild is as much about knowledge and mindfulness as it is about grit.

Fireflies Workshop



For over fifteen years, NDNS has been running its firefly workshop, taking small groups into the habitat so as not to disturb the delicate ecosystem that sustains these glowing insects.

The 45-minute program has become a monsoon-season favourite among children and parents alike, offering a rare glimpse into the fascinating life cycle of fireflies — from an egg stage lasting one to two months, to a larvae stage spent in the soil for as long as a year and a half, before emerging as adults for a fleeting 30 to 45 days.

Of the more than 2,000 firefly species found worldwide, nearly 60% are native to India, though this particular workshop showcases just one — the *Pteroptyx*. Strict rules ensure the fireflies' safety: no one is permitted to catch or carry them home, preserving both the insects and the magic of the experience for visitors to come. Yet even with these precautions and the continued support of local authorities, the years have seen a troubling decline in firefly numbers, largely attributed to increasing light pollution and the growing footfall of people and vehicles near the habitat — a quiet reminder of how fragile such ecosystems truly are.

टिमटिमाते जुगनु तलाश रहे दिल्लीवाले

रिमझिम मौसम की रात, सज रही 'जुगनुओं की बरात'

नई दिल्ली: बरसात का मौसम, हाथ में कम रोशनी वाले टॉर्च, बिना फ्लैश वाले कैमरे और दूबे कदमों के साथ रातों में जुगनुओं को देखने के लिए प्रकृति प्रेमी निकलने लगे हैं। ये इनके ठिकानों की जानकारी पब्लिक नहीं करते। इस बात का भी ध्यान रखते हैं कि उनकी मौजूदगी से जुगनु परेशान न हों।

प्रकृति प्रेमियों के मुताबिक, जुगनु अब रानधानी में कुछ हो जाइए तक सिमट गए हैं। रौन खस के कुछ हिस्सों, यमुना किनारे कम रोशनी वाली झाड़ियों और अरावली के अंदरूनी इलाकों में जुलाई-अगस्त के दौरान इन्हें देख जा सकता है। पहले दक्षिण दिल्ली के कई पार्कों में भी जुगनु नजर आते थे, लेकिन अब ऑर्टिकल लाइट बढ़ने से वे लगभग गायब हो चुके हैं।

न्यू दिल्ली नेवर सोसायटी कीते कई सालों से मॉनसून के दौरान वीकेंड पर जुगनु वॉक करती है। इसकी जगह गोपनीय रखी जाती है और एक घुर में 20 लोगों को ही शामिल किया जाता है। 25 जुलाई से

इस साल की जुगनु वॉक शुरू होगी और पहले वीकेंड की सभी सीटें भर चुकी हैं। सोसायटी के संस्थापक वेलेन खन्ना के मुताबिक, 2016 से जुगनुओं की संख्या में गिरावट शुरू हुई और पिछले 3 साल में यह समस्या और गंभीर हो गई।

प्रजनन पर पड़ रहा असर

एक्सपर्ट्स के अनुसार, जुगनु अंधेरे में अपनी घमक के जरिए रातों को पहचानकर प्रजनन करते हैं। तेज रोशनी के कारण घर और माता एक-दूसरे को पहचान नहीं पाते। इससे उनका प्रजनन प्रभावित हो रहा है। उनका सुझाव है कि पार्कों में मैशन सेसर अपरिचित लाइट लगाई जाएं। छेपे नौकों में रुचि रखने वाले एनसी रोय के अनुसार, मई-जून में जुगनुओं का प्रजनन शुरू होता है और जुलाई से अगस्त की शुरुआत तक उनकी संख्या सबसे अधिक रहती है। मार्च 2026 में जूरी रात की पहली फायरफ्लाई चेकलिस्ट में जुगनुओं की 92 प्रजातियों का दस्तावेजीकरण किया गया। इनमें करीब 61% प्रजातियां केवल भारत में पाई जाती हैं। वेलेन खन्ना ने बताया कि जुगनु सिर्फ रात की खुशमस्ती नहीं बढ़ते बल्कि हेल्दी इकोसिस्टम के संकेतक भी हैं।

इको टूरिजम की संभावना

एक्सपर्ट्स का मानना है कि जुगनुओं का संरक्षण किया जाए तो इको टूरिजम की बड़ी संभावनाएं बन सकती हैं। जापान, मॉरेशिया, इंडोनेशिया और बाली जैसे देशों में फायरफ्लाई टूरिजम करोड़ों रुपये का उद्योग बन चुका है। भारत के महाराष्ट्र और पश्चिमी घाट के कुछ इलाकों में भी ऐसे आयोजन होते हैं।

It is also well documented that courts have repeatedly found forest department officials failing to apply their mind while granting these permissions. In this context, this clearance is simply more bad news for Delhi."

When a tree falls down for any reason like storm, pruning, construction, etc. instead of removing them, efforts should be made to restore the tree back to its original location.

Tree Line- The tree line is the row of trees planted along roads, and boundary walls. It helps keep the colony green, cool, and full of life.

What is a gap in the tree line? A gap means a tree has fallen, dried, or been illegally removed and hasn't been replaced.

What Can You Do? Residents can plant a native tree in the empty spot, especially during monsoon. With basic care like watering and composting, the tree line can be restored and kept healthy.

Illegal Activities and Penalties

 Driving nails into trees causes internal wounds, making them vulnerable to disease, decay, and even death.
Penalty is Rs 10,000/-.

 Wrapping or hanging wires around trees constricts growth, damages the bark, and can lead to electric hazards or slow tree death.
Penalty is Rs 10,000/-.

 Fixing boards onto trees is illegal. Trees are not advertising spaces. Defacing public property is a crime.
Penalty is Rs 10,000/-.

 Digging Within 1 Metre of Trees damages roots, causes stress, and can destabilize the tree. It's illegal and harmful.
FIR will be filed against the person/department involved.

 Cementing Around Tree Base (Within 1 Metre) blocks water and air from reaching roots. It suffocates trees, prevents them from growing wider and weakens them structurally.
Forest department will charge the penalty based on the damage caused.

Help Trees & Animals



The Hon'ble National Green Tribunal (NGT), Principal Bench, New Delhi in O.A. No. 62 of 2013 Aditya, N. Prasad & Ors. v Union of India & Ors., vide its Order dated 23.04.2013 directed,

"In the meanwhile, we direct all the public authorities, more particularly Municipal Corporation of Delhi, DDAs, DTC, DMRC, NHAI and all Government respondents in this petition including the Director General of CPWD, the Chief Engineer, PWD, to ensure that:

1. All the sign boards, names, advertisements, any kind of boards or signages, electric wires and high tension cables or otherwise are removed from the trees forthwith.
2. They shall also ensure that the concrete surrounding the trees within one metre of the trees are removed forthwith and all the trees are looked after well and due precaution is taken in future so that no concrete or construction or repaving work is done at least within one metre radius of the trunk of trees. The Vice-Chairperson, the Commissioner, the Chief Engineer, the Director General and all other senior most officers of the Departments/authorities concerned shall be personally responsible for carrying out this order.
3. The Departments/authorities concerned shall take all and every prohibitive measures to prevent the defoliation of the trees in any manner whatsoever, save only its trimming in accordance with law.
4. All the respondents whose boards are fixed on the trees shall be prosecuted by the respective authorities under in accordance with the relevant law."

TREE CARE

1. Remove cement around the tree, soil space around the tree should not be less than 1 meter on all sides.
2. Remove nails, wires and signboards from trees.
3. In case of holes in the tree caused by nails, you can put wet soil in the injured parts of the tree.
4. Ensure no digging or construction is done within 1 meter of trees.
5. Give water to trees daily.
6. In the forest, trees shed their leaves on the soil floor, those leaves mix with the soil and turn into nutrition for the tree roots to absorb. But around the city streets, all the fallen leaves are swept away, so the trees are not receiving that important nutrition from the fallen leaves. This is why it is extremely important to put leaf compost around trees, to make the trees strong and healthy.
7. If you see a tree cut, or with nails, wires, signboards on it or if the tree is cemented within 1 meter, then please call the Green Helpline and report the issue with the exact location, then they will send you the complaint number by SMS for you to follow up.

HOW TO SAVE FALLEN TREES

De-Choke Trees

The Hon'ble National Green Tribunal in its order dated 23rd April, 2013, has directed all Public Authorities to ensure that all the sign boards, names, advertisements, any kind of boards or signage's, electric wires, and high tension cables or otherwise are removed from the trees.

They shall also ensure that the concrete surrounding the trees within one meter of the trees are removed and all the trees are looked after well and due precaution is taken in future so that no concrete or construction or repairing work is done at least within one meter radius of the trunk of trees.
